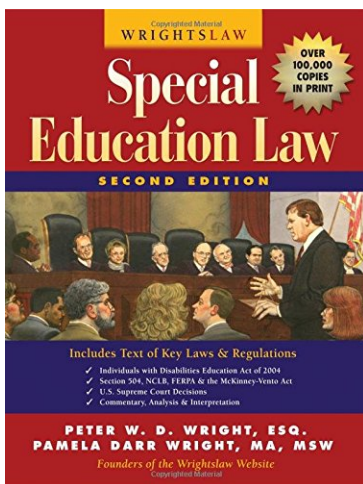

Special Education Law came into effect in 1975, with the passing of Public Law 94-142, also known as the Education for All Handicapped Children Act. This law required schools to protect the rights of, and provide a free appropriate public education for, all students with disabilities, such as mental retardation, learning disabilities, emotional problems, etc. Prior to this law, many individuals with a mental illness or mental retardation were placed in state institutions, quite often receiving minimal clothing, food and care.
